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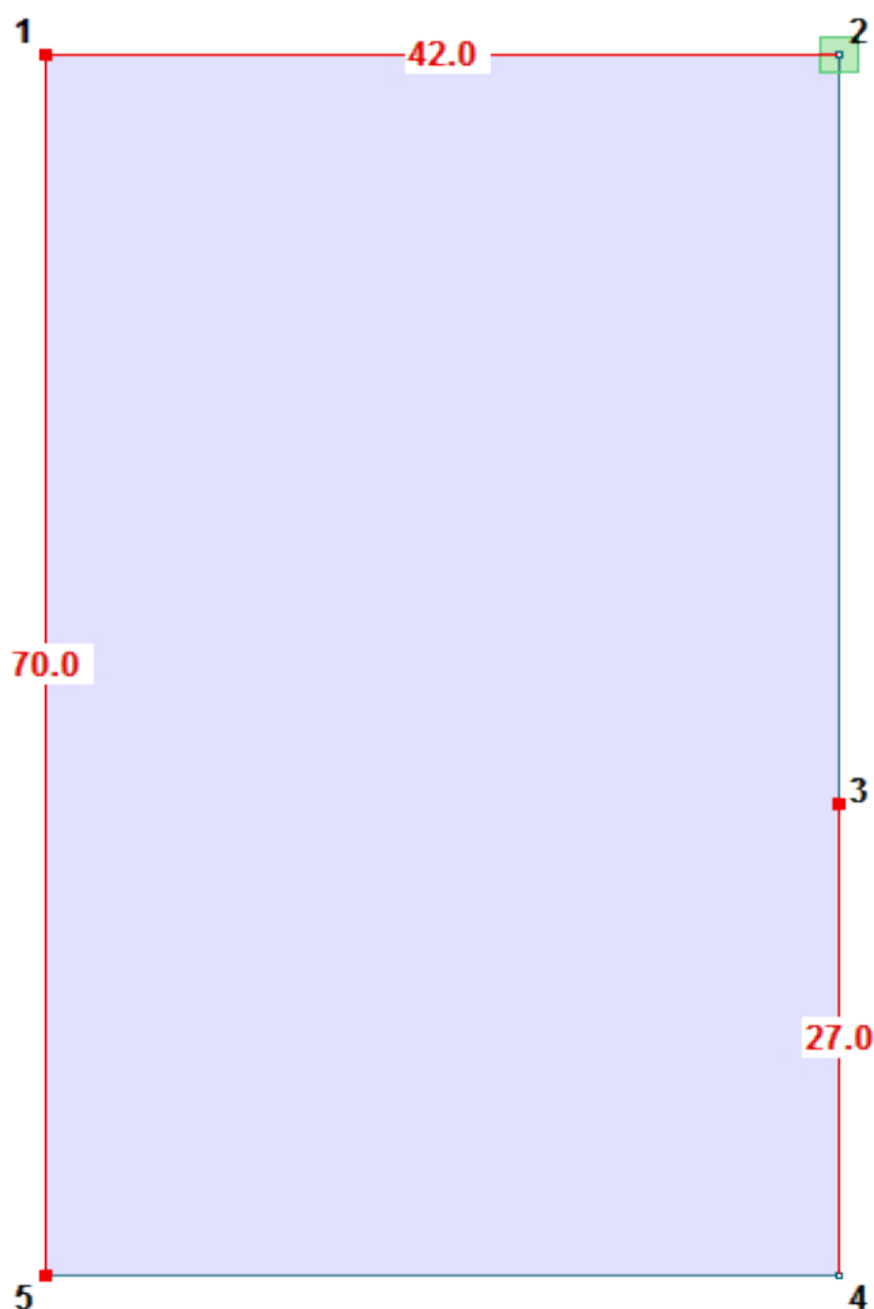
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Casual See-Through Asymmetrical Poncho

Unique Size

This poncho was knitted sideways, stockinette stitch, on my [Silver Reed SK 840](#) standard (4.5mm) knitting machine with ribber.

The front and back parts are identical. This is how the schematic looks, measures are in centimeters:



I used 1 strand of very thin (Nm 2/28) 50% acrylic - 50% viscoze yarn.

Gauge Swatch with Tension 6, Stitch Dial 4:
- 47.06 Stitches & 36.81 Rows per 10 cm (4 in)
Or
- Width of 40 stitches – 8.5 cm (3.34 in);
- Height of 60 rows – 16.3 cm (6.4 in).

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Start with broken toe cast-on which I think is the best, for 198 needles (LN99 - RN99). Here is a tutorial of a great knitter lady:

Set RC to 0, Stitch Dial to 4 for both main bed and ribber carriages.

Knit rows 1-100 stockinette. At row 100 set a marker (for point 3 in the schematic), this is needed for the sewing part.

Continue knitting until row 258.

Transfer all the ribber stitches to the occupied main bed needles (we will have 2 stitches on each needle). Detach the ribber carriage or set it to 0 on the knitting direction (if you detach it you are less prone to make a mistake).

Set Stitch Dial to 10 on the main bed carriage and knit 1 row.

Cast-off using your favourite method, mine is stitch through stitch using the latch tool.

For the sewing part, sew points 2-3 and 4-5. Points 3-4 represent the neck.
